


2022 HARTFORD SENIOR FAIR BOARD POINTS OF IMPORTANCE

VARIOUS ANIMAL UPDATES AND REMINDERS...

— BFFF.

- Additional classes will be offered within the All Other Breeds (AOB) division, separating entries by high and low percentage designations.
- o Market Steer / Heifer weigh-in will take place on Saturday, immediately following Steer Pool weigh-in.

— DAIRY FEEDERS.

Dairy Feeder calves may be only of 100% Holstein or Brown Swiss breeding.

— GOATS.

- o All goats must have approved Scrapies identification!
- o Dairy and Pygmy shows will be held Tuesday, August 9th at 9:00 a.m. in east end of Grubb Arena.
- Only goats entered in Junior Fair classes may stay on the grounds.
- o Market Goat show will include special awards for Bred and Owned entries, increase to ten classes, and the Open Dairy show will have additional lots added.
- o An Open Pygmy Goat show will take place on Thursday evening in B. Carr Arena.

— HORSE.

- o Horse Department schedule will likely have changes... Please watch website and email for updated schedule and rules.
- o No Open Draft Show will be held in 2022.
- o A Groom & Clean Contest will be offered on Sunday in the Horse Complex.

— MARKET LAMBS.

- All market lambs which are ewes, as well as ewes and wethers that are coming from out-of-state, must have USDA approved Scrapies tag identification.
- o Licking County Sheep Improvement Association will sponsor a Carcass Contest for Market Lamb exhibitors. Entry can be made at time of weigh-in for \$5.00 fee. Ultrasound will determine placing. Cash prizes will be awarded.
- o Market Lambs not selling through Market Lamb Sale on Saturday are released immediately following the show. If being taken home, they must be off the grounds by 10:00 a.m. on Thursday. A packer truck will be available to sell extra lambs (day/time TBA). NOTE: All breeding sheep must stay until Saturday.

— BREEDING SHEEP.

- o Breeding sheep exhibitors must have USDA approved Scrapies tags in all ewes, rams, and wethers over 18 months (there are no breeding classes for wethers).
- o Wool classes will be offered in 2022!

— MARKET HOGS.

- O Hog Identification Forms are required of all junior fair hogs. Forms must be submitted to the Hartford Fair Office by May 15th. Up to four (4) hogs may be identified.
- o Ractopamine is no longer forbidden, as it is also permitted during the 2022 Ohio State Fair.
- o Hog showmanship sign-up will take place on Saturday and Sunday, with class assignments being posted early Monday morning.
- o All hogs consigned to sale will be sent to the packer on either Tuesday night or Wednesday. All youth participating in the sale must send one hog on the trailer. Hogs will not be present during the hog sale on Thursday.
- o Any youth bringing a second hog for exhibition will be responsible for removing that hog from the fairgrounds on Friday. Those hogs are not permitted to be taken on the packer truck earlier in the week. These hogs are also eligible to be shown in an open market hog show on Friday.
- o All pens should be cleaned by exhibitors at the time that their hog is removed from the grounds, with absolutely all pens being cleaned by end of the day on Friday.
- o Market Hogs must weigh 200 lbs. to show and must be 220-<u>290</u> to show for championship awards. (maximum weight had been 280 in the past) Market Hog weigh-in will be begin at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday morning during the fair (rather than 10:00 a.m.)

— RABBITS & POULTRY.

- o Egg Layer Turkey classes have been moved to the Fancy seton of the department. Be attentive when making entries.
- o All meat poultry and meat rabbits must weigh-in prior to having sale photo taken during the fair.

GENERAL JUNIOR FAIR LIVESTOCK.

- o All market animal exhibitors must complete their Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) online by 11:59 p.m. on Friday, August 5th. Meat Poultry and Market Hogs will complete their forms after they have arrived to the fairgrounds and either weigh-in (Poultry) or receive official tags (Hogs).
- o Junior fair animals are not permitted to show in both market and breeding shows. Animals must be designated to a single project.
- o All exhibitors are reminded that they are expected to clean stall / bedding areas both during the fair, and then at the conclusion of the fair prior to removing their animals from the grounds.
- o Voucher system is changing in 2022! Vouchers will NOT be handed out to exhibitors during shows and events. Rather, participation and placing will be logged electronically during events, and the exhibitor can then visit the bank the following day to show their ID and claim premiums. (Exception: dog and horse premiums will be paid at the time of judging)

FACILITIES AND BARN SAFETY.

- No floor fans will be permitted in the barn areas. All fans must be hung, for the safety of small children.
- Electrical cords must be good repair and in a safe condition. Unsafe cords will be confiscated.
- Regulations are in place for pop-up tents placed in designated areas near and around barns during the fair:
 - o They can't be put up prior to NOON on Friday, August 5th.
 - o Goat exhibitors will only be permitted to have tents on show days (Sunday, Monday and Friday). This will hopefully help with an air flow issue on the south side of the goat barn.

LIVESTOCK SALES.

Livestock sales checks will be mailed no earlier than 30 days following the sale. All checks will be mailed, no checks will be held for pick-up! There will be a \$35 charge to re-issue a check with a stale date past the 60 days cashing period.

TRAFFIC AND PARKING.

- Updated traffic patterns for livestock to unload on Saturday, August 6th will be announced closer to the fair.
 Be watching the Hartford Website for updates!
- Two areas of preferred / paid parking are available. First, east of the hog barn will be a preferred parking area for cars / trucks (no trailers) at a cost of \$20 per permit. The second area, to the east of the Sheep and Goat barns will be preferred parking for trailers at a cost of \$30 per pass. Trailers remaining on the grounds will be placed in a specific parking area that does not interfere with visitor parking needs.
- Exhibitor vehicles coming on to the grounds in the morning to deliver feed and hay may only do so prior to 10:00 a.m. Those vehicles must return to a parking lot prior to 10 a.m.
- Camper arrival... Campers are permitted to enter through Gate D beginning at noon on Tuesday No campers are permitted to park alongside road prior to that time (SAFETY ISSUES). Campers will then be lined up in the North Parking Lot and be permitted to enter the campground on Wednesday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m.
 - There are also additional regulations in place for 2022 regarding cars parked in the campground. Those camping at the fair are strongly encouraged to view those rules in their camper packet!

...AND OTHER ITEMS.

- Fair Book will be available only in electronic format, via website.
- Alcoholic beverages will be available for sale on the fairgrounds throughout the fair. Beverages will be sold
 in the general area of the grandstands, with those beverages not being permitted beyond the Race Horse
 Barns (to the East), and the Gazebo (to the West). No alcoholic beverages can be taken into the area of junior
 fair programming.
- Entries are due by 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 18th. Verification forms should be mailed by no later than July 7th, with late entries being accepted until July 22nd. Should you not receive your verification or be out of town during the time that it should arrive, please contact the Fair Office to verify your entry information.
- Daily admission will be \$8, with season passes being sold for \$45 at the Fair Office.
- Be sure to stay up to date through the Hartford Fair website and Facebook pages.
- Photo IDs... Schedule of when photos will be taken for exhibitors / advisors' IDs will be posted to the Hartford Fair website and shared on social media. Please be attentive and have photos taken in a timely manner, if a photo needs to be taken.
 - o All exhibitors last name N-Z, and any exhibitor who did not have a junior fair ID in 2021 will need to have a photo taken (including all new members).
 - o All 4-H and FFA Advisors are asked to have a new photo taken in 2022.

Entries:

Entry Deadline is 5 PM, June 18th. All entry forms will be available online. These forms can be completed online, saved as a PDF file, and printed. You will need to print the completed form in order to add signatures. Entry changes may be made until July 22nd. No changes will be allowed after this date. Any new entry or additional entries received after 5 PM, June 18th and before July 22nd will be charged a late fee. No entry or change will be permitted after July 22nd. You should be able to find department and entry information on our website, www.hartfordfair.com by the end of April.

We can't stress enough to please get your entries in as early as possible! If you wait until deadline, you may be paying a late fee. Any incomplete entry, such as incorrect form, project, or missing signatures will not be processed until corrected. Be sure to pay attention to the type of form you are using and the entry limitations. Only Market Entries should be on the Market form and all other livestock would use the Non-Market form. All still projects displayed in the 4-H Center or FFA building will use the Individual Still Project form.

We strongly encourage club advisors to turn in all members' entries together whenever possible. Advisors will need to schedule an appointment during office hours. If necessary, some evenings and weekends will be available. Please email beth@hartfordfair.com to schedule your club's appointment.

If it is not possible for an advisor to submit an entry, the exhibitor may do one of the following:

- Mail an entry and payment to the fair office Hartford Fair Entries, 14028 Fairgrounds Rd, Croton, OH 43013. Must be postmarked no later than 5 PM, June 18, 2022.
- E-mail your completed entry form(s) to <u>beth@hartfordfair.com</u>. Once emailed you will then need to call Beth @ 740-893-4881 to pay your entry fee by credit card. Payment must be made before entry will be processed.
- If neither of these are possible, you can email browley@hartfordfair.com or call Beth @740-893-4881 to make arrangements to drop off at the fair office so they can be checked.

135 Goat Project Options:

- 135BD Breeding Dairy Goats (Does only, no wethers. May not have horns).
 - Alpine
 - o LaMancha
 - o Nigerian Dwarf
 - Nubian
 - Saanen
 - Toggenburg
 - Any breed crosses (breeds listed above)
- 135BM Breeding Meat Goats (horns are optional)
 - Boer Goats / Boer-Cross Goats
 - o Fiber Goats Angora & Cashmere (do not need to be shaved in order to show in the meat classes)
 - Kiko Goats

• 135F - Fiber Goats

- No Fiber exhibit opportunity during Hartford Fair. Can show in meat goat division, but must enter Meat Goat Breeding Doe classes. Fiber Goat wethers may enter Pack Goat classes during the fair.
- Fiber Goats do not need to be sheared to exhibit.

• 135H - Harness Goats

- May be any breed.
- o Must be shown in Pack Goat classes for fair entries. Harness classes are not offered during Hartford Fair.

• 135M - Market - Dairy, Meat, or Cross Goats

- Horns are optional.
- Any breed, but must meet weight requirements for Hartford Fair.
- All Market Goats must have milk teeth intact at weigh-in during the Hartford Fair in order to qualify for market classes.
 (This replaces previous rule that goats must be born after January 1st).

135P – Pack Goats

- o This can be any breed of goat.
- Must show only in Pack Goat classes during Hartford Fair, not in breeding classes.
- Horns are optional.

135PY – Pygmy Goats

- o Pygmy does and wethers to show in Pygmy Goat Show during Hartford Fair.
- Horns are optional.

• 135C - Companion - Pet Goats

- This is considered a Special Interest Project and will NOT be eligible to show at the fair.
- This would be judged during Special Interest Judging Day in July without the goat being present.

Additional Notes Pertaining to Goat Projects:

- No bucks on the Hartford Fairgrounds. Only those goats entered in Junior Fair classes will be stalled on the grounds.
- Only one entry per animal in a class, with the exception of showmanship that you sign up for day of goat show (i.e. market goat project can only be in market goat class cannot by shown additionally in breeding doe class, pack goat projects can only be shown in pack goat class and cannot be shown additionally in breed class.

Tips for Getting Started with your <u>Goat</u> Project Prepared by Hartford Goat Improvement Committee

"GOOD CARE MEANS GOOD HEALTH!"

FEEDING.

Hay... nice looking, green alfalfa, clover or mixed alfalfa/clover/grass. Should not be dusty or moldy.

Water...fresh water twice a day.

Grain...pre-bagged goat feed or prepare your own balanced ration.

Free choice salt or mineral salt and baking soda... for rumen function.

See Goat Resource Book for complete guidelines for feeding

HEALTH.

Signs of Illness:

Any change in normal behavior, especially inactivity.

Poor appetite or not eating at all.

Change in color or consistency of manure.

Urinates more than usual.

Grinds teeth.

Coat becomes rough or dull.

Color of gums and lining membranes around eyes becomes pale or blue.

Changes in milk for breeding does.

Goats normal temperature is 103 +/- 2 degrees.

Vaccinations: CDT to prevent enterotoxemia, associated with high grain intake, and tetanus, at least at 8 and 12 weeks of age and yearly thereafter. Give booster to does 30-60 days before kidding to cover newborn kids.

Parasites: Goats are highly susceptible to worms. If there is weight loss, or gums/eye membranes become pale, goat need wormed. Take feces (manure) specimen to lab for ID of worm type and use appropriate worm medication. Most wormer dosages need to be doubled label directions to be effective on goats. Check with your veterinarian. If you have access to rotation in five seperate grazing areas, moving goats to a new location each week in rotating order is an effective method of preventing worm problems. The complete life cycle of most "goat worms" is four weeks. Worm medications also have withdrawal dates that need to be watched at slaughter/sale time.

Coccidiosis: This is an illness caused by a protozoan parasite that becomes a problem due to manure contamination of feed and water. A common sign of this illness is dark diarrhea, and general weight loss. If untreated, goat will die. If not treated as soon as the diarrhea is noticed, the gastrointestinal tract absorption of the goat can be damaged for life. Call a veterinarian for the proper meds. To decrease this problem make sure feeders are high enough that they can't be jumped into, and change water frequently.

Signs of Illness: any change in normal behavior

- Inactive
- Eats less or not at all
- Urinates more than usual
- Change in color of consistency of manure
- Grinds teeth
- Changes in milk with lactating does
- Temperature above or below normal (normal is 103 +/- 2 Degrees)
- Coat becomes rough or dull of hair falls out
- Color of gums, lining around eyes becomes pale or bluish

HOUSING:

Protect from wind, precipitation, sun, predators, dampness, and injury. Provide shelter / barn; keeping in mind 10-12 square feet needed per animal.

FOOT CARE:

Prevent foot rot with clean, dry housing and proper foot trimming. Keep hooves trimmed with sharp hoof knife or hoof trimmers about every six weeks.

MARKET GOAT TATTOOING.

All market goats must be tagged and registered to participate in the Hartford Fair. Tagging will be done the third Saturday in May. This year that will be May 21,2022 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.. Cost is \$2.00 per animal. This will take place at the Hartford fairgrounds. Goats being tagged must be designated to an individual exhibitor at the time of tagging. There will also be a weighing of those animals that wish to participate in the rate of gain contest. If you cannot bring your animal on this date you must have your 4-H advisor call Jared McLaughlin (Senior Fair Board member),

MARKET GOAT REQUIREMENTS: HARTFORD FAIR.

- May use wether or doe
- Milk teeth must be present at weigh-in on Sunday of the fair.
- All goats must have a USDA-approved Scrapies Eradication ID tag.
- Horns are optional for Market Goats.
- Full-body clip ten (10) days prior to the fair for Market Goats.
- Minimum weight 45# (there is no maximum weight).
- One animal per exhibitor to sell.
- Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion must sell. Sale is terminal for these two animals and drug testing will be completed following selection.
- Weigh in Sunday morning of the fair at 10:00 am before the open market goat show.
- Exhibitor / family is expected to attend Barn Meeting at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday of fair.
- Exhibitor must be present with project at show and sale.
- At weigh-in each exhibitor must designate if animal is to sell.
- Goats are not permitted to be exercised in the Horse Complex, nor the parking areas to the east/ south of horse barns.
- Only those goats entered in Junior Fair classes can be stalled on the grounds throughout the fair. (NEW in 2022!)



National Scrapie Eradication Program: Animal Identification and Recordkeeping Guide for Sheep and Goats

Scrapie is a fatal, degenerative disease affecting the central nervous system of sheep and goats. There is no cure or treatment for scrapie.

The National Scrapie Eradication Program, coordinated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), has reduced the prevalence of scrapie in adult sheep sampled at slaughter by over 99 percent. However, the cooperation of sheep and goat producers is needed to find and eliminate the last few cases in the United States.

Producers are required to follow Federal and State regulations for officially identifying their sheep and goats. Producers must also keep herd records, showing what new animals were added and what animals left the herd/flock. This guide helps producers follow the regulations.

How to Get Official Eartags

The National Scrapie Eradication Program provides a limited number of free official ear tags to sheep and goat producers. In response to feedback from and collaboration with the sheep and goat industry, APHIS will provide up to 80 free, plastic tags to first time participants in the sheep and goat identification program through fiscal year (FY) 2020. APHIS is working with sheep and goat organizations to transition toward electronic identification to improve our nation's ability to quickly trace exposed and diseased animals in the event of an outbreak. Our goal is to start to transition to electronic identification by fall 2020.

The no-cost metal tags previously provided to producers will be phased out in summer 2019, when the currently obligated funding is expended. During the phase out, APHIS will continue to provide, upon request, up to 100 serial metal tags free of charge to producers (either regular orange metal serial tags or blue slaughter-only metal serial tags) who haven't received APHIS-provided tags within the previous 24 months. Dealers and markets may continue to receive metal serial tags at no cost through FY 2020.

To find out if you are eligible for the free tags or to get a flock ID assigned to your flock so you can buy official tags, call 866-USDA-TAG (873-2824). Producers who prefer another type or color of tag or need more tags may purchase official tags directly from approved manufacturers to fit their needs. See the "Approved Tag Manufacturers" section below for more information.

Guidance on Application of USDA Required Microchip Location Tattoos to Goats/Sheep with Registration Tattoos - August 2019


- An E (electronic ID at the base of the ear) or ET (electronic ID in tail fold) tattoo (at least 0.3 inches high in the ear or, in the case of earless animals, the tail fold) must be applied in order to use an implanted microchip (EID) as official ID. NOTE: The EID must have an 840 number or have been implanted before March 11, 2015.
- If using EIDs in animals with registry tattoos:
 - O Check with your registry on placement of the E or ET tattoo and any other specific requirements. Some registries that use registry tattoos may limit if or where you can place the E or ET tattoo on a registered animal. For example, the American Dairy Goat Association requires you to include the E or ET in the tattoo comment on the registration application and to apply the E or ET tattoo in the left ear or if the ear is not usable the tail fold.
 - The E or ET should go above or below the registry tattoo, so that it remains distinct from the registry numbers.
- An E or ET tattoo is only required if the EID is being used as official ID. As a result, if your registry tattoo meets the requirements for official ID you don't have to tattoo the E or ET on the animal. NOTE: To use a registry tattoo as official ID the registry must be approved by <u>APHIS</u> or the tattoo prefix must be provided to APHIS and be recorded with your flock's record in the National Scrapie Database and the animal must be moving as a registered animal with a copy of its registration certificate or a fully completed application for registration within 60 days of sale.
- If you sell an animal without registration papers, you need to do one of the following:
 - O To move in slaughter channels or to a livestock market, tag the animal with an official ear tag linked to the registry tattoo and EID in your records.
 - o To move other than in slaughter channels or to a livestock market:
 - Tattoo the animal with your USDA assigned flock ID and ET or E on a separate line. NOTE: The animal must be accompanied by an implant reader that can read the implant in the animal; or
 - Tag the animal with an official ear tag linked to the registry tattoo and EID in your records.






Flock ID Tattoos:

- The Flock ID that has been assigned to the owner must be tattooed in the right ear and an individual animal ID number must be tattooed in the left ear of the animal
 - Animals with either absent or injured ears can have the tattoo in the tail web or flank
- The tattoo must be legible
- The animal cannot be in a slaughter channel
- The animal must be accompanied by a statement that contains the Flock of Origin information
 - o Examples: ICVI, Owner/Hauler Statement, market bill of sale, etc.



Registration Tattoo:

- The Breed Registry Prefix that has been assigned to the owner must be tattooed in the right ear and an individual animal ID number must be tattooed in the left ear
 - o Animals with either absent or injured eats can have the tattoo in the tail web or flank
- The tattoo must be legible
- The animal cannot be in a slaughter channel
- A copy of the registration certificate must accompany the animal at all times
 - This certificate should have the tattoo information printed on it from the registry and must correspond to the tattoo in the animal's ears
 - o If the certificate is not in the name of the current owner, a copy of the completed application for transfer of ownership in the name of the current owner is permitted provided the sale occurred within the last 60 days


Official ID Types for Sheep and Goats

Microchip or Implant (All Animals):

- Implants must be located between the skin and the cartilage of the back side of the ear or between the skin and the bone of the tail near the base of the tail
 - o The animal must be tattooed with a legible "E" if the implant is at the base of the ear, or an "ET" if the implant is in the tail fold ★
- The animal must be accompanied by an implant reader
- The implant must comply with ISO 11784 and ISO 11785
- The implant number must be an Animal Identification Number (840) issued to the flock of origin
- The movement must be either for exhibition purposes or other movement without change of ownership
- · The animal cannot be in a slaughter channel

Registered Animals:

 Registered animals must be accompanied by a registration certificate in the name of the current owner where the implant number has been recorded on the certificate





General Preventive Health Recommendations for Animals Exhibited at the Hartford Independent Fair

It is encouraged that all participants have a current relationship with their veterinarian in order to foster the best preventive health care plan for their animals.

Please note: If your animal is under medical treatment at the fair, treatment must be overseen by the official Fair Veterinarian. Please report to the Veterinarian or the Fair Director to ensure compliance with tampering laws and exhibition rules.

Vaccination and internal parasite control must be administered at least 30 days prior to the start of the Fair.

<u>Special Note to Market Animals</u>: **All medications and vaccinations should be given under the guidance of a licensed veterinarian. All meat residues (withdrawal times) must be expired prior to exhibition. Consult your veterinarian for specific protocol recommendations and keep records of medication and dosages. These guidelines are to help protect the animals travelling into and out of the fairgrounds and to comply with residue avoidance guidelines.

Beef Cattle:

- 1. Vaccines: IBR, BRSV, BVD, PI3, Leptospirosis, Clostridial diseases(7) including Tetanus
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 3. External Parasite Control: Free of infectious external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Dairy Cattle (including Dairy Feeder Calves):

- 1. Vaccines: IBR, BRSV, BVD, PI3, Leptospirosis, Clostridial diseases(7) including Tetanus
 - a. **Dairy Feeder Calves: Given at vaccination clinic as required (1st Saturday in June)
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 3. External Parasite Control: Free of infections external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Goats:

- 1. Vaccines: Clostridium types C&D and Tetanus
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 3. External Parasite Control: Free of infections external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Poultry:

- 1. Vaccines: Vary depending upon management protocol. Consult your veterinarian.
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 3. External Parasite Control: Free of infections external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Rabbits:

- 1. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 2. External Parasite Control: Free of infections external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Sheep:

- 1. Vaccines: Clostridium types C& D and Tetanus
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 3. External Parasite Control: Free of infectious external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Swine:

- 1. Vaccines: Mycoplasma, Influenza, Erysipelas, Circovirus
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: On a preventive internal parasite protocol.**
- 3. External Parasite Control: Free of infectious external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.

Equine – Horse / Pony:

- 1. Vaccines: West Nile Virus, Eastern Equine Encephalitis, Western Equine Encephalitis, Tetanus, Rhinopneumonitis (EHV 4/1), Equine Influenza, Rabies.
 - a. These vaccines are required per fair rules.
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: De-worming is individualized per horse/per stable environment. It is recommended that your horse maintain a Fecal Egg Count of < 200 epg. Consult your veterinarian for the best protocol for your individual horse.
- 3. External Parasite Control: Horses should be free of all infectious external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.
- 4. Body Condition Score of > 4/9.

Canine:

- 1. Vaccines: Current Rabies, Distemper, Hepatitis (Adenovirus), Parvovirus, Parainfluenza, 4 way Leptospirosis, and Bordatella (Kennel Cough)
 - a. These vaccines are required per fair rules.
 - b. Veterinarian's Certificate posted at <u>www.licking.osu.edu</u> > 4-H Youth Development > Member Resources
- 2. Internal Parasite Control: Monthly heartworm and internal parasite control consistent with your veterinarian's recommendations for your dog.
- 3. External Parasite Control: Monthly prevention for fleas and ticks as well as free of all infectious external parasites and infections such as Lice, Mites, and Ringworm.
- 4. Body Condition Score of 2.5/5 minimum.

NOTICE of REQUIREMENT for MARKET CATTLE, GOAT, SHEEP & SWINE EXHIBITORS

Dear Youth Exhibitor;

In 1997, the Food and Drug Administration adopted a regulation, 21 CFR 589.2000, prohibiting the feeding of any ruminant-derived protein (meat and bone meal) to cattle and other ruminants. This regulation resulted from efforts to control any possible introduction or spread of Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) or "Mad Cow Disease" into the domestic cattle herd of the United States.

Because of worldwide media attention over the past few years on the BSE issue and a desire to reassure consumers that all possible steps are being taken to continue to keep BSE out of the United States, a number of beef packers/processors and retail operations have established certification programs for their suppliers to insure that they are not receiving cattle or other ruminants that have been fed ruminant-derived protein materials.

Participating packers in the certification program have made it clear that they will not purchase any cattle, sheep, swine, or goats from producers who have not signed a certificate certifying that indicated animals have been fed any feed containing protein derived from ruminant tissues and/or that none of the livestock being sold have illegal levels of drug residues. Thus, for some packers and buyers to purchase your cattle, we will need to have the certification on the back of this sheet signed and turned in upon arriving to the scales during weigh-in at the fair. If your animals do not weigh in, they will be collected during barn meetings or at a specific time posted in your barn.

I hope that we can work together to insure that the animals contributed to the general food supply through the 4-H and FFA programs may continue to be both safe and wholesome. Please feel free to contact me with any questions.


