GENERAL RULES

1. See Jr. Fair Rules and By-Laws published in beginning of Jr. Fair section of this tabloid. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to understand these Hartford Fair Rules.
 2. **In addition to stated rules all activities shall be governed by the uniform rules for 4-H Horse Shows (circular 179) as adopted and supplemented by Jr. and/or Sr. Fair Board.**
 3. Licking Co. club member's horse identification papers with full horse/pony name, must be turned into The Licking County Extension Office & Delaware/Knox Co. club members horse identification papers must be turned into the Hartford Fair office by May 1st of current year. Same full horse/pony names must be on fair entry form to be graded. Any horse brought to the fair that does not have matching entry and ID papers will be disqualified.
 4. All exhibitors must complete a Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) for each horse and turn in at time of grading. In place of Animal ID # fill in the horse's name as it appears on the ID papers. Department Directors will review all DUNF and will contact the fair's veterinarian regarding any questionable medication.
 5. All Horses and Ponies must be pre-entered to show on an official Hartford Fair Entry Blank. The name of the horse being exhibited must match the name listed on the ID form submitted on or before May 1st to be eligible to show.
 6. All 4-H equine projects being shown at the Hartford Fair, must be vaccinated for the following: 1.) West Nile Combo & Include Tetanus 2) Rhino-Flu 3) Equine Rabies.
 7. All 4-H exhibitors entering the fair must present to the vet check station: a vet vaccine record (obtained from a vet that administered vaccines). Also, on this form will be a body condition score given by the vet at the time vaccines were given and written on vaccines record.
 8. All barns will close at 11:00 pm every night.
- Protesting and Drug Testing:**
1. Horses or ponies may be drug tested at the discretion of the Sr. Fair Board. If the animal test positive for a prohibited drug, the test will be at the cost of the exhibitor.
 2. Protests must be made in writing and signed by the party or parties making the protest. All protests must be accompanied by a \$250.00 cash fee. If lab testing is requested or required, the protester will pay ALL associated drug testing costs and stipulate in the protest what drug the animal is being tested for.
 3. Any exhibitor guilty of showing an animal under the influence of any prohibited drug, substance, supplement or failing to file a veterinarian's certificate prior to the show will be disqualified. The exhibitor will forfeit all winnings for the show. The exhibitor will be ineligible to participate at The Hartford Fair the following year.
 4. NO Dogs allowed in the horse complex except for guide dogs
 5. ALL Exhibitors or parties on a horse are required to wear ASTM & SEI approved head gear during the fair
 6. No Alcohol or illegal substances are permitted in the horse complex.
 7. All exhibitors, advisors and club members must abide by posted barn rules.
 8. The Hartford Fair Board, judge, fair vet or show official have the right and responsibility to remove from the show ring any animal exhibiting unsafe or unsound behavior.
 9. **Participation is a privilege, not a right.** All Exhibitors, advisors, parents, and club members must abide by posted barn rules. Unsportsmanlike conduct or abuse toward an animal or others is grounds for dismissal from the fairgrounds.

Horseless Horse and Beginner:

10. Horseless Horse Mentorship Projects may show either or both English & Western. Refer to Dept 110, special notes and entry information.
11. Beginners are NOT Permitted to show in any 3-gaited classes during the current year fair they are exhibiting at.
 - A. Horseless Horse and Beginner Dress Code: Horseless and Beginner Members participating at the Hartford Independent Fair must wear the following uniform:
 - i. Plain, solid white oxford, long sleeve, full button-down shirt (no bling) – All Disciplines.
 - ii. Western classes and Contesting classes: appropriate boots, jeans or slacks (black or blue), any color of tie and helmet cover may be used, no chaps. Gloves are optional.
 - iii. English: plain white ratcatcher, appropriate boots, breeches, full harness on helmet in riding classes, no jackets. Gloves are optional.

- iv. Approved Safety helmets (ASTM/SEI) are required in all riding classes.

12. Pop-Up Tents: Two pop-up tents per 4-H club permitted in the horse complex.

13. Arena Rules:

- a. The ONLY horses/pony permitted on the grounds stalled or hauled in are those animals pre-entered and competing at The Hartford Independent Fair. **NO HAUL-IN SCHOOLING!!!**
- b. Main Arena & Make up pen: ONLY exhibitors (and one assistant, if necessary, for beginner, horseless or Therapeutic riders) in the class following the currently running class will be allowed. **NO spectators in the warm-up area. Exhibitors are permitted 1-2, who should exit when the class enters the arena.**
- c. All Classes over 20 entries will be split
- d. We will use the West Gate for all entry into the arena and the East Gate for all exiting. We ask that area of the out gate be kept clear to ensure proper distancing measures.

14. Stalling Rules:

- a. **Horse/pony choosing to stall on the grounds are permitted to move onto the grounds Saturday, August 6, 2022. All stalled horses will be released to leave the fairgrounds on Saturday, August 13, 2022.**
- b. If an exhibitor requests a stall and does not use the stall, the exhibitor will be INELIGIBLE for a stall the next year.
- c. **Only one horse or pony per exhibitor may be stalled at the fair. NO SWITCHING OF HORSES.**
- d. **Tack boxes, shavings and stall prep needs to be in place 24 hours prior to animal arrival.**
- e. **Vet check will take place at the stalls at a time to be announced.**
- f. All loading and unloading will be completed in designated horse complex parking area.
- g. No Trucks and trailers removing stalled horses permitted to be left in the parking area on Friday night.
- h. If the horse/pony needs to be removed from the fairgrounds prior to the official release time on Saturday, August 13th, the exhibitor must notify the Hartford Fair Horse Department Chair to acquire an "Early Release".
- i. Posted Stalling Assignments are Final! NO Changes!
- j. Stalls not in use by a Junior Fair exhibitor will be assigned as tack stalls at the discretion of the Jr & Sr Fair Board to clubs and exhibitors staying on the grounds.
- k. Stalls cards MUST be filled out completely with emergency contact information, no exceptions!
- l. Exhibitors requesting a stall on their entry will be stalled with their 4-H club (regardless of horse size). If the health or safety of the horse or pony becomes an issue due to stall size, the fair board has the discretion to have the animal removed.
- m. Bedding is to be pine shavings or straw. All stalls are to be cleaned out prior to exiting the fair after release on August 13th. If the exhibitor fails to clean their stall, they will be ineligible for a stall the following year.
- n. **STALL DECORATIONS MAY NOT BE ATTACHED TO THE BARN WITH NAILS, SCREWS, TAPE, OR STAPLES!!!**
- o. No Hanging of any air-chairs, hammocks, or swings of any kind in the aisles or from the barn. Tack boxes and equipment should NOT block any aisles in barns.
- p. No Crock pots, fridges, or cooking devices to be plugged in tack stall or aisles.

15. Haul- In Exhibitors:

- a. Haul-In's using a stall for the day will adhere to all applicable stalling rules.
- b. All Haul-In horses must be on grounds by 8:00 am for vet check and grading taking place in the horse complex.
- c. Only horse/pony being exhibited is permitted on the grounds. **NO HAUL-IN SCHOOLING!!**
- d. Each club will be designated Haul-in stalls to be used by their club members choosing to haul-in and use for the day.
- e. Clubs will need to complete Haul-In ID form to identify what club members will be using designated stalls for their club each day.
- f. **ALL HAUL-IN HORSE/PONY MUST EXIT THE GROUNDS WITHIN AN HOUR OF SHOW CONCLUSION. NO EXCEPTIONS!** If the horse or pony remains on the fairgrounds past 10 pm the exhibitor will be ineligible for a stall the remainder of the fair and next year.

SPECIAL NOTES

Due to significant changes regarding schedule, rules and additional activities in this division, careful attention should be given to these sections. Exhibitors must participate in the grading class JA to be eligible for all classes in the Contest, Hitch, English, and Western. Completed Project Book must be presented at grading. Grading will be based on grooming, condition of the animal, general knowledge of the project, and completion of project book & equine record book if applicable.

Copies of the grading rules will be available at the entry booth. Ribbons will be awarded only to those members who exhibit. Trophies and ribbons will be awarded in all other classes. Grading class entries must be made by fair entry deadline.

ENTRY RULES & INFORMATION

- Only 6 Horse Entries**
- Make a separate Equine Entry Form for each horse/pony that will be graded for premium. If more than one horse is entered, you can list both on the Livestock Entry Form & attach an Equine Entry Form for each horse entered.
- You must state horse/pony's full name on both entry forms.
- Only exhibitor of horse/pony may make an entry for grading. Horseless projects see note below.
- Only one grade per animal.
- Refer to schedule for entries in events and contest.
- A \$2.00 entry fee per class will be charged on all Jr. Fair and Fun Show classes. The entry fee for Jr. & Sr. Versatility Divisions will be \$5.00.

NEW EQUINE REPLACEMENT RULE

If an Equine Project Animal sustains injury or becomes ill between the Hartford Fair entry submission date of June 18, 2022, and July 29, 2022, an exhibitor may apply for review and approval by The Hartford Senior Fair Board for a replacement Equine project. Please see the criteria below:

- The replacement and injured/ill Horse/Pony must have a properly completed and submitted Horse/Pony ID form by the appropriate deadline.

How to Apply: Send or drop off the following items filled out by end of business day July 29, 2022, to The Hartford Fair Office:

- A letter from an exhibitor requesting for a replacement equine project outlining why and the horse/pony's name that is unable to compete and stating the horse/pony project they wish to use as a replacement. (All Horse/Pony Names must match horse/pony ID form)
- Letter with signature from your Veterinary confirming injury/illness of the horse/pony unable to compete.
- Complete entry and equine forms for the replacement horse/pony
- An exhibitor will maintain their division with the replacement horse/pony. The exhibitor may not switch from horseless to beginner, beginner to age group, or age group to beginner with a replacement animal.

When Will I know? Exhibitors applying for replacement project will be notified by end of business day on July 30th.

What if my Horse/Pony sustains injury or is unable to compete after July 29th? Unless an exhibitor completed an additional horse/pony ID and entry for another horse to compete, we are unable to consider a replacement animal after the deadline

DEFINED TERMS

Horseless:

Horseless classes are for exhibitors who enrolled in the Horseless Horse Mentorship Project. These youth do not own or lease a horse. Horseless riding classes are Walk-Trot only. Horseless exhibitors are not eligible to show in Beginner

Beginner:

For beginner exhibitors in their first or second calendar year of showing and who have no experience in any form of competition at the canter or lope. Beginner riding classes are Walk-Trot only. Beginner exhibitors may not have previously shown any 3 gaited classes and maintain Beginner status.

Age Group Classes:

For the experienced exhibitors showing in the appropriate age division at the Walk-Trot-Canter/Lope. Age Group exhibitors are not eligible to show in Beginner classes.

Note:

For assistance in selecting appropriate division, 4-H/FFA members should consult with their advisors.

CHAMPION EQUINE SHOWMAN RULES & ELIGIBILITY

Eligibility to compete in divisional showmanship champion classes:

1st & 2nd place winners from the following classes on English & Western days:

English Day: 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, & 13
Western Day: 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, & 43

Eligible class winners have the option to compete in their divisional champion showmanship class on day of divisional show.

IF an exhibitor wins a divisional showmanship championship class (places 1st), they are ineligible to compete in a divisional showmanship champion class for the remainder of the current year fair. The exhibitor may still compete in their pre-entered showmanship class, but if they win 1st or 2nd place, they are ineligible for the championship class. An exhibitor may only win 1 divisional showmanship championship at the current year fair.

The Western and English showmanship champions will work off in the Equine Champion Showman class on Tuesday to determine the Champion Equine Showman. The Champion Equine Showman will compete with their horse as the Equine delegate in Super Showmanship on Friday Morning. Please refer to the Super Showmanship Division Winners in the Jr. Fair info. Committee & Bylaw section for additional rules for the Super Showmanship Contest.

GROOM AND CLEAN CONTEST

GENERAL RULES

- Each team will consist of 3 contestants and a holder and must provide a safe horse or pony for the contest.
- Horse must be at least 13.2 hands or taller.
- Horse must have a properly fitted flat nylon or leather halter (no show halters) and a tie rope.
- Horses must meet a minimum Body Condition Score (BCS) of 4, in order to participate.
- Show sheen or products that make it easier for dirt to be removed from the hair coat are strictly prohibited prior to being muddied.
- Grooming of any horse participating in the contest after muddying and prior to the grooming portion of the contest by any person will result in the disqualification of the team associated with that horse.
- Judges have the right to substitute any horse prior to the beginning of the contest. If the horse is not sufficiently muddy at the start of the competition, the team may be penalized. If the horse does not have sufficient length of mane at the start of the competition, the team may be penalized. If the horse has a roached mane, the team may be severely penalized.

EQUIPMENT:

- Basic groom equipment necessary: Curry (rubber or plastic), Body Brush, Stiff Brush, Dandy Brush, Mane and tail comb or brush (not both), Hoof pick and grooming cloth. Only one ground cloth, quart of water, fly spray and chain lead are optional for showmanship.
- Three complete sets of grooming equipment are best (one for each contestant on the team).
- Equipment is to be placed on the ground behind the horse on a ground cloth with bristles facing up.

TEAMS:

- Must be currently enrolled in or completed a 4-H/FFA-horse project.
- 4-H, FFA, or OHC Organization may enter junior (9-13 years) and senior (14-18 years) teams of three (3) members. There will be an additional holder for each team.
- Teams may use a member from another club if needed to fill a team. A junior can be used on a senior team, but you cannot use a senior on a junior team.
- All team members **MUST WEAR** boots or heavy leather shoes and long pants.

COMPETITION PROCEDURE:

- At least two hours before the scheduled start, team members will apply the mud uniformly over the horses/ponies under the supervision. Allow more drying time if the weather is damp.
- The horses/ponies will be dirtied using mud (sandy mud does not work). Never put mud in body openings or in cracks or tight places (i.e., between the rear legs).
- Once competition begins, total time for grooming is 30 minutes. Teams are told by the announcer when only 10, 5 and 2 minutes remain --- then STOP. Equipment is replaced on the ground cloth. Teams return to their starting position away from the horse/pony
- Handlers will have control of the horses/ponies at all times and line the teams up in numerical order. They will maintain a safe distance between horses/ponies and move horses/ponies (after telling team members) only as needed for safety.
- Handlers will not coach the team members in any way. They will speak to team members only when necessary to maintain safety.
- ANY COACHING from the handler or spectators will result in the disqualification of the team

SHOWMANSHIP:

- Teams are given 10 minutes to work with their groomed horse/pony to prepare for showmanship.
- No attire change will be allowed. You must start and finish the competition in the same outfit. 4-H rules will apply in showmanship.
- The only equipment change allowed for the showing will be a chain lead strap to replace the tie rope used while grooming. NO halter change.
- All three members will be judged on their ability to show the horse/pony. Each member will show the horse/pony as instructed by the judge. The team members will decide which one will do each part of the pattern.
- The showmanship pattern will be determined by the judges and posted one hour prior to the contest.

ALL JUNIOR FAIR MARKET ANIMAL EXHIBITORS

GENERAL RULES

1. Exhibits eligible to sell as outlined below:

A. Steer Pool	F. Gallon Milk
B. Market Beef Steer/Heifer	G. Commercial Meat Rabbit
C. Dairy Feeder Steer	H. Commercial Meat Poultry
D. Market Hog	I. Market Goat
E. Market Lamb	
2. Exhibitors are limited to sell a maximum of two (2) exhibits and only one exhibit per division. Note: Exhibits in rule 1A, B & C are considered one division. Market Steers and Dairy Feeder Steers are eligible for sale only if exhibitor is not selling a steer pool steer.
3. Meat projects and Gallon of Milk will be the only projects allowed to be sold at the sales sponsored by the Hartford Fair Board. The only additional item will be the traveling item sponsored by the Hartford Fair Board for the Youth Program.
4. Two percent (2%) will be deducted from sale price of all exhibits sold for sale promotion.
5. All harvested animals are subject to inspection by the Ohio Department of Agriculture. Discrepancies will be turned over to the Ohio Department of Agriculture. Payment is subject to Ohio Department of Agriculture inspection.
6. All Grand and Reserve Champions (as defined in rule #1 above) must sell, which counts towards your limit of two sales. One species per division per exhibitor may sell, except Grand and Reserve Champion which must sell.
7. The Hartford Independent Agricultural Society reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions or differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Hartford Independent Fair. It further reserves the right to determine unforeseen matters not covered by these rules, to amend or add to these rules as in its judgment it may determine, and to withdraw all premium offering in all departments should any emergency exist and circumstances demand it.
8. Disregard of any rule by exhibitor, contestant, or concessionaires forfeits all premiums, rights and privileges without recourse and will subject the violator to such penalty as the Hartford Independent Fair Management may order.
9. In the event of conflict between the general rules and the special rules governing the various departments, the special rules will take precedence.
10. Unhealthy or unsound animals will not be eligible for sale.
11. All buyers will be provided a color photo on an “I Supported the Hartford Fair Sale” sign. Grand & Reserve Champions must have pictures taken with buyer unless the buyer wishes to remain anonymous.
12. All sale orders will be determined by a computer-generated random sort. Only Grand Champions and Reserve Champions will be moved to the top of the sale order. The only exception to this rule will be for Steer Pool exhibitors.
13. Sale checks will be mailed 30 days after the fair. The Hartford Fair reserves the right to withhold an exhibitor’s sale check if the situation is deemed necessary.

- Important Notice -

Exhibitors are limited to sell a maximum of two (2) exhibits. One species per division per exhibitor may sell, except Grand and Reserve Champion which must sell. If you chose to participate in the Gallon of Milk Sale, this will count as one of the two.

All sale order will be determined by computer generated random sort. Only Grand and Reserve Champions will be moved to the top of the sale order. The only exception to this rule will be for Steer Pool – exhibitors will sell by draw number.

All weights, by the Hartford Fair’s (county certified) scales, will be final and no other scales will be allowed on the fair premises.

The livestock sale will be a “Premium” sale. Details available from Sr. & Jr. Fair Board Members.

**Sale checks will be mailed 30 days after the fair.
There is a \$35 fee to re-issue checks not cashed
within 60 days.**

GALLON OF MILK

1. The total dollar amount collected will be divided evenly among dairy exhibitors that chose to participate in sale.
2. Sale to be limited to 1/2 hour.
3. One representative gallon of milk will be sold.

MARKET BEEF STEERS/HEIFER

1. The champion and reserve champion must sell.
2. All must weigh at least 950# to sell.
3. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in sale and computer will draw randomly for sale order. Only Grand and Reserve Champions will be moved to top of sale
4. Buyers to absorb harvesting cost on top two animals.
5. Beef check-off will be deducted.

DAIRY FEEDER STEERS

1. Grand and Reserve Champion must sell.
2. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in the sale and a computer will randomly draw for sale order.
3. Only Grand and Reserve Champions will be moved to top of sale order.
4. Must weigh minimum of 400# in order to sell.
5. Beef check-off will be deducted.

STEER POOL

1. All steer pool steers MUST sell.
2. The sale order is the same as drawing order.
3. Hauling cost will be deducted from all steer pool sales.
4. Harvest cost to be absorbed by the buyer of all steer pool animals.
5. All steer pool steers will go to carcass show.
6. Beef check-off will be deducted.

MARKET HOG

1. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in sale and computer will draw randomly for sale order. Only Grand Champion Gilt, Grand Champion Barrow, Reserve Champion Gilt, Reserve Champion Barrow will be moved to top of sale order.
2. Sale weights will be 200# & over. Under 200# will NOT sell in the Livestock Sale. There will be no re-weighs of hogs under 200#.
3. Pork check-off will be deducted.
4. \$1.00 tagging fee will be deducted.
5. Supreme Grand & Reserve must go to a fair approved processor. If you choose to participate in the Jr Livestock Sale, the hog designated to sell must be forfeited to the packer truck. Any hog not designated to sell is eligible to show in the Open Breeding/Market Show and must be off fairgrounds one hour after conclusion of show.

MARKET LAMB & LAMB POOL

1. The Overall Champion and Reserve Champion Single must sell. They will be harvested & tested.
2. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in sale and computer will draw randomly for sale order. Market Lambs - Only Grand and Reserve Champions will be moved to top of sale order. All lambs must weight minimum of 95# except Southdown and Cheviots, which must weigh 85#. All pen of two (2) lambs must weigh 190# except Southdown and Cheviots, which must weigh 170#.
3. Lamb and Wool check-off will be deducted.
4. All male lambs must be castrated.
5. The buyer will absorb harvesting cost.
6. All animals are to be slickshorn.

MARKET GOATS

1. Only one Market Goat per exhibitor, regardless of 4-H or FFA, may be sold, except if an exhibitor has Grand and/or Reserve Champion in more than one area of this sale.
2. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in sale and computer will draw randomly for sale order. Only Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will be moved to top of sale order.
3. Grand and Reserve Champion Market Goats MUST sell.
4. Exhibitor must be present with project at show and sale. Exceptions can be made at the discretion of Sale Committee.
5. Grand and Reserve Champions must have pictures taken with buyer unless the buyer wishes to remain anonymous.
6. A minimum weight of 45# for a Market Goat will be required to sell the Market Goat. A member of the Small Animals Sale Committee will be present at Market Goat weigh-ins.
7. All animals are to be slickshorn
8. Market Goats sold by lot, not by pound
9. The buyer will absorb harvesting hauling cost.

POULTRY

1. Only one lot per exhibitor may be sold, except if an exhibitor has Grand and/or Reserve Champion in more than one area of this sale.
2. All Grand and Reserve Champions of meats must sell.
3. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in sale and computer will draw randomly for sale order. Only Grand and Reserve Champions will be moved to top of sale order.
4. Exhibitors must be present with project at sale. Exceptions can be made at the discretion of Sale Committee.
5. Meat classes: Chicken, Duck, Geese, & Turkey projects may sell at sale. (Market poultry raised for meat purposes only, commercial)
6. Egg laying & Fancy classes will not sell.
7. Grand and Reserve Champions must have pictures taken with buyer unless the buyer wishes to remain anonymous.
8. Animals sold by lot and not by the pound.

RABBITS

1. Only one lot of meat project may be sold per exhibitor except if a member has Grand and/or Reserve Champion in more than one area of this sale.
2. All Grand and Reserve Champion meat projects must sell.
3. At time of weigh in exhibitor must state which animal will be in sale and computer will draw randomly for sale order. Only Grand and Reserve Champions will be moved to top of sale order.
4. Exhibitors must be present with project at sale. Exceptions can be made at the discretion of Sale Committee.
5. Animals are sold by the lot, not by the pound.
6. Grand and Reserve Champion must have pictures taken with buyer unless the buyer wishes to remain anonymous.
